FROM RABBI SAM

A Matter of Perspective

We are now in the Hebrew month of Cheshvan. It is often called Mar (bitter) Cheshvan because, some say, it is unhappy that it is the only month without any ritual Jewish observance it can call its own. This is especially poignant as it follows on the heels of the busiest month, Tishri, and is itself followed by Kislev (the month is which we observe Chanukah). Cheshvan, however, is not as empty as it thinks. True there are no formal observances or festivals in this month. But there is a richness of history and a challenge of future potential unique to Cheshvan.

According to the tradition Cheshvan is the month in which the flood of Noah began and ended. It is, therefore, the month of the first Biblical covenant between God and the world – the covenant marked by the rainbow. This is, in fact, the only covenantal sign that is universal.

Another traditional understanding of the cycle of months is that each month is also connected to one of the 12 tribes. The tribe designated for Cheshvan is Menasseh, the elder son of Joseph. Menasseh, along with his younger brother Ephraim, were adopted by Jacob when the full family was reunited in Egypt. Ephraim and Menasseh were given the full status of “son” equal to the 11 brothers of Joseph. Jacob declared that all his descendants would bless their sons in the names of Ephraim and Menasseh. It is traditional even to this day that sons are blessed at the Friday evening dinner table in the names of Ephraim and Menasseh.

(Daughters are blessed in the names of Sara, Rebecca, Leah, and Rachel.)

For the future, one tradition states that the Messiah will arrive in the month of Cheshvan. Thus, the promise of universal well-being and goodness for the world belongs to this month. With the arrival of the Messiah will be the establishment of the Messianic age – a time of peace and prosperity for all; an end to poverty, hunger, homelessness, war, and all hatred and divisiveness.

Cheshvan can serve, therefore, as a model for our vision of ourselves and the world. Like Cheshvan, it is all too easy to become embittered by how we see ourselves in relationship to others or to the past. We may look back and feel that it was better then. Or we may think others are in a better place than we are. We may even simply feel bad for what we lack.

On the other hand, we can pause and step back. We can move from MarCheshvan to simply Cheshvan. Another phase of life is upon us. Thus we can seek to become inspired to live and create our own highest potential as we celebrate the good we have known and shared. Let us always learn to say, “I have seen and shared rainbows and I will be a builder toward goodness in the days to come.”

As we move through our own Cheshvans in life may we always seek to remind ourselves that richness and joy come not from comparing ourselves to others or the past. Rather, true contentment of spirit comes from building a community that nurtures and grows the present into a stronger and brighter future. Then we will truly be ready to enter into Kislev and light candles of hope for all.



To Stand or Not to Stand...So We Danced!

In the beginning, we danced and stepped on each others toes. Then Rabbi Sam made a few inquiries; congregants asked a few more questions; and the Ritual Committee did, too. The next time you attend a Shabbat Service, we will likely move, speak, sway, and dance in unison. Rabbi Sam figured out that most Temple Israel congregants like to be asked to *rise* and *sit* during specific parts of a service. *Mishkah T'fila* purposefully did not include those directives. Neither is there italicized text for responsive readings. Rabbi Sam will also cue us for responsive readings. In addition, we will sing *Oseh Shalom* after reciting Kaddish.

When you host an oneg, you will be invited to light the candles. Please let Rabbi Sam or a member of your Ritual Committee know if there is a particular tradition you would like share with the community by leading a part of a Shabbat Service. Celebrate the anniversary of your Bar/Bat Mitzvah, an upcoming wedding, commemorate a Yahrzeit, etc. Rabbi Sam would like give you an honor to participate in services by doing a reading, leading a song or prayer, or reciting Kiddush. Contact him for more information on service opportunities. We hope you will embrace the opportunities to celebrate and participate in regular Shabbat services and other holidays. Remember, the first Friday of every month, special blessings will be given to those celebrating a birthday or anniversary.
