Telling Our Stories – From Torah to Midrash

This month the weekly Torah readings move from Genesis into Exodus (in Hebrew from Bereishit into Shemot). We begin the month with the final section of Genesis – the final chapters of the Patriarchal stories. These final chapters of Joseph's life culminate in his father Jacob and family of 66 moving down into Egypt – bringing the total of the family in Egypt to 70. The next two Torah portions chronicle a time when the Pharaoh of Egypt is one who no longer remembers Joseph and the reason for all these foreigners living in his border country. The story gives us only a few insights into the early years of Moses and the descendents of Jacob's 12 sons.

The time frame of the book of Genesis is some 2000 years with the bulk of the stories focusing on a period of less than 200 years (the middle and late age of Abraham through the death of Joseph).

There is then a gap of unrecorded history of several hundred years before the opening words of Exodus. What happened to the offspring of Jacob's sons? How did they grow from a family of 70 to a people of perhaps some ten thousand? What connection did they maintain with the traditions and legacy of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob? And how did

they go from being temporary sojourners during a time of famine into a settled community and then slaves to this new Pharaoh? Since none of these questions is directly answered in the Torah, the Rabbis were given a wide range of opportunities to create Midrashim. Even the early life of Moses is given minimal account in the Torah and is, thus, fuel for Midrashic expansion. The Rabbis have taught that when the Torah does not specifically state and it does not definitively preclude information, we may learn from the silence. The process for this learning is called Midrash.

The Torah teaches us how to live with a deeper spiritual view of the world. The questions we bring to the Torah are: What does the Torah tell us in the words and stories it contains? What does the Torah tell us in the words and stories it only implies? Both of these questions are equally crucial to understanding the lessons and teachings of Judaism. Midrash is one of the most traditional ways of searching for the answers to these questions.

The Torah is alive for us today as we listen to and learn from all teachings. Through divrei Torah (teachings shared as a part of formal worship services), adult education sessions and classes, and informal learning, Temple Israel offers a variety of ways to make Torah live and challenge us in our lives.

Join us and be an active part of a growing, learning community.
