Does God Go On Vacation?

Summer often seems like a time for Temples to slow down and scale back on activities. Many Synagogues do not offer the possibility for Bar or Bat Mitzvah services, more lay services are conducted, Adult Education programs are not run, and Religious School sessions are not held. Certainly some of these are based on the needs and desires of the community (how many children would attend Religious School when there is no public school in session and vacation plans are fulfilled?). In other cases the Rabbi and Temple professionals can use some vacation and R&R, too. But the Jewish calendar keeps on going and religious observances also occur during these months.

Granted many of these observances are not well known or emphasized in Reform practice (when was the last time you fasted on the 17th of Tammuz or the 9th of Av?). Other practices, however, are becoming popular once more and they can be found in the summer as in every season. There is a Rosh Chodesh (new moon celebration) in June, July, and August and the pre-High Holy Day preparation month (Elul) begins on August 19 this year. Shabbat still manages to show up every Friday evening.

This summer, at Temple Israel, we have an active series of opportunities to continue to share and grow toward our future together. The list below is a sampling of what we are planning

for June through August. For a full list of times and details, be sure to check the website regularly for updated information.

- First Friday: tots on the bima, pot-luck dinner and early services
- First Saturday: full service with Torah reading
- Third Friday: kabbalat Shabbat music and reflection by the pond
- Special Dinner Theater program June 16
- Temple Annual meeting June 21
- Special Sisterhood hosted Shabbat June 22
- All other Fridays: regular Shabbat evening service
- All other Saturdays: regular Shabbat morning Torah study
- Bar and Bat Mitzvah tutoring
- Youth Group meetings and events

So it seems, at least in Dover, God will be sticking around for the summer. On the other, if you do happen to go on vacation this summer; God is actually very happy to join you. There are wonderful travel Shabbat kits you can take along with you. Summer is a time to relax and take a break from the work and school grinds. But that is also what Shabbat intends to provide on a weekly basis.


