FROM RABBI SAM

Where Do You Shop?

On Rosh HaShanna evening I offered the challenge "How Do You Shop?". I suggested that there are many different ways that people do their grocery shopping. Some make lists ahead; some make lists as they use up the food or supply; some shop as needed; some shop daily or several times a week; some shop "religiously" on a set schedule; some do a major shopping when supplies and food; some check the list to be sure they have what they came for; some shop impulsively; some discuss new items with fellow shoppers, the store staff, or the checkout cashier; and some do something else. I concluded that there is no one "right" style but, rather, only what works for the shopper. Shopping styles, however, may change over time or may be negotiated within family settings. All of this, I then challenged could be analogous to one's shopping style for Jewish connection, fulfillment, or growth.

I ended my d'var by alluding to the idea that even as some people think there is only one grocery to shop at and go there "faithfully"; others find a variety of sources for different shopping needs. I would like to continue this challenge and analogy to shopping for Jewish fulfillment.

My question now is not "How do you shop?" I do not believe that there is only one source for all Jewish connections any more than there is one store that meets all needs. In shopping, there are stores that provide only some of the needs one might seek but do so with a sense of personal support and more direct and friendly service. Other stores may offer virtually everything one might need but become impersonal and difficult to navigate. Still others seek to be large enough to cover most needs but small enough to assure that staff can provide a

friendly and supportive environment. Some of us shop in several different similar stores depending on which is most convenient at the time, what is on sale, quality or variety, etc.

Similarly, many find their Jewish growth and needs are supported and nurtured in different ways at different times. These might include daily practices and rituals, community service and social justice, life cycle ceremonies, family gatherings, High Holy Day and festival observance, and/or Shabbat worship and study.

We here at Temple Israel are committed to providing an abiding sense of sacred community through high quality Religious School and Adult Education programs, varieties of Shabbat and Holy Day worship experiences, holiday and festival events, socialization for young adults (High School, College, and beyond), intergenerational celebration, and opportunities for social justice and a shared service to the needs of the Seacoast population. Families (which we define as one or more persons living as a part of a shared experience) of all structures are always welcome to any and all programs, services, and events.

While we are not, and do not strive to be, a source to meet all Jewish needs; we (myself, Tammy, and the congregational leadership) here at Temple Israel are always willing to entertain new "products" we can bring to our membership and those looking to us for support. For those seeking to find ways to create more personal or family paths to Jewish connection, we offer shared study sessions and personal support and counseling. For community involvement we certainly have much to offer.

During this new year, consider exploring our congregational opportunities and invite your friends to sample or just "browse". Remember to check the website regularly for all our services, events, and programs.

May your New Year be filled with goodness.


