Explore Jewish Boston

August brings the end of the summer and the, hopefully, more relaxing schedule and pace for most. This year, it also signals the imminent approach of the High Holy Days. The month of Elul — beginning on August 7 — in the Jewish calendar marks the preparation for the New Year. According to the tradition, we sound the shofar each weekday morning of the month as a call and reminder to close out the spiritual business of the old year and prepare to look forward to the opening of the book of life for the coming year.

August/Elul this year offers challenges and opportunities. One set of these might be to visit and explore some of the offerings of Jewish culture and history that is available in the Boston area. Whether you have never explored or are returning to familiar sites, consider a day trip or longer. The list here is simply a highlight of what you might visit and experience.

The Vilna Shul, West End, and North End

The Vilna Shul is the last immigrant era Synagogue still standing. It contains a comprehensive overview of the history and development of the Greater Boston Jewish community. It serves as a Jewish cultural center and offers a wide range of Jewish educational and experiential programs. The Dead Sea Scrolls

The Dead Sea Scrolls exhibit will be in Boston only until October 20. Housed at the Boston Museum of Science (a great place to visit in its own right), the exhibit includes a fascinating history of the scrolls and their meaning in understanding the roots of Rabbinic Judaism and Christianity. The Anne Frank Chestnut

Now planted in the Boston Common is one of 11 saplings from the Chestnut Tree seen by Anne Frank during her time of hiding. Though small, the tree and plaque carry a deep history and significance.
