FROM RABBI SAM

Reform Jewish Spirituality Part 2

I left off last month with the NICA (Moberg committee) definition of spirituality: “Spiritual well-being is the affirmation of life in a relationship with God, self, community and environment that nurtures and celebrates wholeness.” For a decade after that, the bulk of the spiritual care providers in the world of Gerontology created measures for assessing spiritual well-being in the elderly (especially the frail institutionalized members). These were generally more measures of religiosity than of spirituality. They asked about faith community and text connections and/or prayer and other faith based rituals and practices.

My contribution to the this process as a full time Geriatric Chaplain and active part of the American Society on Aging and its sub-group the Forum on Religion Spirituality and Aging (FORSA) led to the following:

‘Spirituality refers to the search for or the creation of a personal sense of meaning, value, and purpose in life in relationship with family, community, society, the world, and/or God.’

In this way I attempted to broaden the idea of spiritual well-being and resources away from a strictly theological perspective into a more human based system. While the original impetus came from Rabbi A. J. Heschel out of the White House Conference on Aging of 1961, the language soon derived more from the works of Victor Frankl who spoke of the basic human drive as a will to

create meaning in life. Frankl and others (like myself) broadened the language to include purpose and value.

My expansion of the one line into a more full examination can be found as the second page of my Rabbi article for this month (http://www.dovertemple.org/rabbis_study/index.htm). This includes a commentary on the definition and a graphic commentary on the paragraph of commentary.

In the process of learning from the frail (physically) elders who were thriving (spiritually) despite their multitude of losses, I discovered several common threads of resources they had found to maintain and support their sense of life goals and well-being. It seemed that the human condition consisted of two main elements. One I called the perceptual realm which included all aspects of life that were definable, quantifiable, able to be assessed and measured. On the other side was the opposite realm - the spiritual, which was the none of these.

The challenge then to creating some form of spiritual assessment tool seemed impossible. In order to meet this task, I found that Hebrew provided some extra insights. The details of Hebrew language and basic world view (e.g., the idea that the words for spirit derive from the words for wind and breath) and the beginning of spiritual language in my model will be in the November Kesher.

From the President's Yom Kippur Greeting

On Rosh Hashanah I paraphrased John F Kennedy and said ask not what Temple Israel of Dover can do for you, but rather what you can do for Temple Israel of Dover. Apparently it was not just Kennedy that I paraphrased but I was reminded later that day that Sharon said the same words about 8 years ago or so when she stood up here and addressed you as President.

In a recent conversation I had with several members – both long time and relatively new - I asked what brought them to Temple Israel of Dover. I was expecting to hear different reasons from each but I did not. Instead, although not using the same words, the reasons were very close - they felt like they were becoming part of a tribe, and as such they were with others that shared the same interests, concerns, desires, wants, needs, and most of all, religion.

And the tribe needs help. We need help on the Board of Trustees, the tribal council, if you will, and we need help with the tasks involved in running a tribe. So what can you do?

First, although it sounds scary, we need to add members to the Board of Trustees to fill the vacancies, and there are several. We currently need a Vice President and 5 Trustees. Of the Trustee positions two will fill unexpired terms ending in June 2016, two will fill unexpired terms ending in June 2017, and one will fill an unexpired term ending in June 2018. The VP position is until June 2017. This is a great chance to try it out and if it works for you and the Temple, then it is a win-win..

The commitment to be on the Board is to attend the monthly meetings and to assist in setting the goals and direction of the temple community. If you can't make a meeting or two, no problem – life happens. And there is no mandatory or expected financial commitment other than that your financial commitment is current. That's it!

It would be great if we have a VP or Trustee who is willing to step up to the Presidency, and we will have an opening in June 2017 when my current term expires, but that is not a requirement of being VP or a Trustee. The only requirement for any of these positions is the commitment to our tribe - Temple of Israel of Dover - and its future success.

We also need to staff committees. One of the important additions we have made very recently, and it has been long overdue, is a Caring and Community Committee. The importance of this committee is highlighted due to the part-time status of Rabbi Sam and it will fill a critical niche that we have been missing. The Committee will be co-chaired by Julie Serrano and Cathi Cherry-Liston. They, in conjunction with Rabbi Sam and Tammy Fascetta in the office, are working out the details of the committee, but basically if you or your family have a need due to illness or death, please call Tammy in the office, or Julie, or Cathi, or me, and we as a team will make sure your needs are met to be best of our ability. If you are interested in assisting on the committee, and no special skills are needed, please talk to Cathi or Julie, or me or Rabbi Sam.

We do not have a Membership Committee and that is another critical void we need to fill. You don't need to be in Marketing, Advertising, or Sales to be on the Committee – you need to have a desire to help us grow our community in all age brackets, whether it is the empty nesters or families with young children, or anywhere in between.

Fund Raising is another missing ingredient. If you have an idea for a fund raiser talk to me and even better would be if you tell me you are willing to work on it. The Board tackled the problem of finances and a home but we still need extra income to secure the future.

Now we need to complete the other side of the equation and grow the membership and expand the community, and we do that by getting our committee structure back to functioning status. I know we are all busy, have lots of other things to do, have children active in sports and other activities, all of which put demands on your personal tribe's time. **But now the larger community could use some of your time.** And if you are not a member, or know someone who is not, we would be glad to answer any questions. Member, or not, all are always welcome at Temple Israel here in Dover.

May this year be a good year, a sweet year, for you and yours. Shana Tova.
