FROM RABBI SAM

Reform Jewish Spirituality Part 6

Personal (internal) spirituality, as we have seen, is a process of finding/creating meaning out of life's experiences and seeking or developing a sense of purpose for one's own future. The basic elements for this are found in the writings of Victor Frankl (see "Man's Search for Meaning" as well as his later writings). The third dimension of one's personal spirituality is the recognition of the unity of value for each person (including and the self as the starting point).

Relational (external) spirituality is a mutual process of recognizing and validating the "other" as a fully spiritual being as well. The basic elements of this can be found in Martin Buber's "I and Thou". The relational spiritual system is always a two way process of validating and being validated. If it is not, then it is not fully spiritual. In Buber's terms it would be an "I-It" relationship. Ultimately relational spirituality is between two or more persons. Certainly one can find spiritual growth and fulfillment in relationship with a pet or other non-human "other". Since we cannot, at this time, assess or identify the "spirit" of a non-human "other" this is not within the scope of the current discussion.

It may be helpful to look again at the "bagel" model of the human spirit (on page two of the February Rabbi Article found on the Temple website). The spiral around the "person" reflects a mean distance of all the

"others" who are themselves personal spiritual entities. Note that the spiral is connected most closely to the individual in the relationship I call the "spouse".

In cases of a long term "spousal" relationship, the external edge of the two persons may be so close that there is, at times, virtually no distance between them. This lack of spiritual separation is often expressed in such relationships as, "I do not know where s/he begins and I end", filling in the other's sentences or thoughts in a mutually supportive way, or simply being present with each other no matter what geographical distance there might be.

In all spiritual "spousal" relations, the distance between the two individuals is the minimum possible distance. Put in other terms, the definition of "spouse" as a spiritual relationship might be: that person with whom the individual has the closest and most intimate spiritual relationship. Note that this does not necessarily equate to religious or legal definitions of spouse. That there may be more than one "other" for the individual in a spousal relationship under differing times and circumstances without conflicting with or "cheating" on the most frequently identified "spouse" will be part of a future discussion on the pathways to the spirit.

In non-spousal connections, the spiritual distance between individuals grows as the number increases. This will be explored in more detail in the March Keshet and Rabbi Article.



