Reform Jewish Spirituality Part 11

In the first ten articles of this series, the approach to understanding spirituality from a definable or perceptual framework has focused on the individual in relationship to the self and others as separate entities or processes. The "Bagel" model of spirituality depicts the self as a "black box" without regards to the actual workings or pathways to the hidden spirit at the center (the "bagel hole").

For the next series of articles, the graphic view of this model of the human spirit focuses on the actual workings or pathways of the spirit.

The "bagel" picture envisions the self as a 3-dimensional entity analogous to the spatial and temporal world. Where, in the perceptual world, there is height/depth/length in the spatial realm and past/present/future in our temporal awareness; in the 3-dimensional spiritual realm there is meaning/value/purpose.

This model, the "Wheel of the Human Spirit" (page two of the July Rabbi article on the Temple website) explores the dynamics of interaction between the spirit and the self. In the "Bagel" model analogy to the perceptual world was the guiding process. For the "Wheel" the spirit is known through its effects. The analogy to this can be seen in the challenge to demonstrate that air exists outside of a close room. In looking through the windows the air is posited as the cause of the leaves moving or

the branches of trees swaying. It may also be helpful to recognize that in Hebrew the words of spirit or soul are from the same roots as the words for air, breath, or wind.

Note that the spirit still resides in the center of the "Wheel" even as it did in the "Bagel". Ultimately, the spirit cannot be found through direct measurement and only exists in human awareness as long as the "breath" is in the body. Attempts to locate or define the spirit are beyond the scope and purpose of this understanding of human spirituality.

Note that the "Wheel" is divided into two hemispheres. The right half is titled "Internal" or "Identity (Self)" and the left is "External" or "Interactive (People/Nature)". The right half views the circle of the self from the previous viewpoint and the left side represents the spiral that was around the circle of the self.

In the former view, as the distance between the self and others increased (the power, in a sense, of each individual's connection to the self thus decreasing) the actual number of others in spiritual relationship increased as well.

In this model of the "Wheel", the use of quantitative analogies is replaced by an analysis of the qualitative aspects of each of the spiritual pathways and the relationships between and among all of the pathways.

The August article will enter into the realm of understanding the 'Wheel" and the various implications and applications.

President's Message July 2016

For those who did not make it to the June 26 Annual Meeting, a brief update.

Attendance was 18 people present, and 15 ballots received. Proposed slate was elected as anticipated, and the proposed Amendment to the By-Laws to add the Temple Youth Group to the Board, and to reduce the number of Trustees from 9 to 6, both passed with no opposition. That was the good news.

So where do we go from here? With a 23% return on the ballot (15 ballots out of 65 member units) and only 18 people being present, is that who you want to make decisions and decide the future of Temple Israel of Dover?

To put it differently, what do you want Temple Israel to be for you? How can we help you, and in turn you help us, to make Temple Israel a source of Judaic content, culture, comradery, and connection, for you and your family? What type of programming, events, social gatherings, etc., would interest you? What do we need to do to be able to say hello to you at the Temple or a Temple event, other than at the High Holidays?

This past weekend there was a screening of 'Beneath the Helmet: From High School to the Home Front' at a congregant's home. The film, a 2014 documentary, follows five young Israeli high school students as they are drafted into the IDF and their transformation from students to soldiers. The turnout was better than I anticipated and following the film there was a discussion of the content. It was a very enjoyable evening.

As a follow-up there is a short documentary that follows one of the soldiers, an Ethiopian who migrated to Israel with his family when he was 12. We will be showing it sometime this summer.

In addition, there are several other films that we will be using this summer as part of a Film Festival that we will kick off this summer and hopefully continue throughout the year. They may not be box office hits, but they all have some Jewish relevance and will stimulate conversation and discussion. There will be a small donation and I guarantee it will be significantly less that going out to the movies. And we'll throw in some refreshments and only ask that you silence your cell phones.

So this will be a start to doing some fun and fund raising. As to how successful we are will depend on you. We need to raise about \$15,000 in fund raising to add to our bottom line. And of course if you have additional ideas for fund raising, and/or would like to help put them into place, let me know.

Last but not least, I am pleased to report that two people have stepped up and agreed to be on the Board to fill the vacant slots. Unfortunately the ballot had been sent out before their agreement was confirmed so in accordance with the By-Laws I will present them as my nominations to the Board for approval at the July Board meeting.
